A Message from the Chair of Governors

I'm sorry to share with you the very sad news that Mrs Jennings has decided to leave her role as Federation Headteacher at the end of this calendar year to take up new career opportunities. Mrs Jennings started as Headteacher in April 2020, having previously been Head of St Nicholas C of E Middle School. I was fortunate to be on the interview panel which appointed Mrs Jennings and we were all hugely impressed by her passion, commitment and dedication to providing the best experience possible for our children. She has continued to demonstrate all of these qualities throughout her tenure as Headteacher.

We didn't know at that interview that when she took up the role this would be just a few weeks into the first lockdown and that Mrs Jennings would spend a considerable part of the next year or so leading the schools through the immense challenges of the Covid pandemic with lockdowns, remote learning, bubbles and social distancing, enforced class closures due to staff and pupil covid cases, followed by the return to full school opening and bringing children back up to speed. It is a huge testament to Mrs Jennings and all of the staff that despite all of this and other challenges too we have seen so many improvements and positive developments across the Federation during her leadership – which I will reflect on more fully in a future newsletter.

I am delighted to advise you that Mr Hawthorn, our current Deputy Head, has kindly agreed to take on the role of Acting Headteacher pending the appointment of Mrs Jennings' permanent replacement. I'm equally delighted to report that Mrs Greenfield will be stepping up to the role of Acting Deputy Head role during this time. As you know Mr Hawthorn and Mrs Greenfield are both excellent and experienced senior staff and members of the current leadership team. They know both schools well and care deeply about them, so the ongoing leadership of the schools is in very safe hands.

Nonetheless, Mrs Jennings will be a huge loss to the Federation. All the Governors, pupils and staff will miss her and and I'm sure, like me, you are all very sorry she is leaving.

We will all hopefully have the chance in the coming weeks to thank Mrs Jennings properly for all of her outstanding work and her wonderful leadership of our schools.





Year 3 - Cherry Blossom - Miss Bristoll






Year 6 - Swallow - Miss K A Smith


At the end of last half term, Swallow Class created some Greek vases in art. They turned out fantastically well – here are some examples!

Careers



This term, Year 7s have begun the first of a course of Career sessions, to be held once a month throughout the year. The aim is to get them thinking about their future career paths, so that they are motivated to learn and focus on their own individual skills and talents.

Do you have to drive to school?

Most children live close enough to walk or cycle to school. Please consider this option. It's often faster than driving in the rush-hour and looking for a safe and legal place to park. Walking is good exercise for children... and for you! Additional benefits include significantly better air quality outside cars (especially if you use quieter back streets) and children arrive better prepared to settle in class and learn after an active, stimulating and energetic journey to school.

If you really must drive, allow time to park safely and considerately, and do not block entrances, driveways, or junctions - you may have to park some distance away from the school and walk the rest. Morning arrival and afternoon departure of pupils inevitably results in traffic jams near schools so allow plenty of time for your journey. Try walking or cycling one day, it may be faster!

If you can walk, hold your child's hand, especially when crossing roads and teach them correct road safety skills for life. You can play your part in reinforcing the road safety education which your child receives at school.

No Parents should be parking on the yellow zig zags or in the bus turning circle area. This is dangerous! Please don't!

Encourage your child to take regular breaks from checking their social media platforms. You could suggest ... that they turn off their app notifications during certain times of the day so they can focus on other things.

4. ENCOURAGE OTHER HOBBIES OR INTERESTS

Spending time away from their phone and devices will offer them an opportunity to discover other interests and activities they may enjoy. This could be sports, playing a musical instrument or creative interests such as arts and crafts.



5. OFFER YOUR SUPPORT

Inappropriate and harmful content can be accessed on the internet which may impact your child's mental health. Explain to your child that not everything online is real and ensure they know that you are there to support and advise them about any worries or anxieties they may have.
